At WTC we are constantly asking questions. Sometimes those are internal questions, like what does our community need and how can we better meet those needs? Sometimes those are external questions, like what is our role within our growing network of community organizations to create impact on a particular issue?

With the National Day of Awareness for Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls and 2SLGBTQQIA+ people earlier this week, we've been asking ourselves what more municipalities can do to advance the <a href="MMIWG2S Calls to">MMIWG2S Calls to</a> Justice. We urge you to take on this question too. Consider reaching out to your elected leaders to ask:

- Are you prioritizing or adequately resourcing commitments to justice for MMIWG2S in your municipal budgets? Do you have funding allocations to Indigenous-led organizations, affordable housing initiatives, harm reduction services, and culturally-affirming health care, including Indigenous-led healing lodges for Indigenous women, girls and 2SLGBTQQIA+ peoples?
- Is your municipality co-creating community and peer-led crisis management initiatives, non-police mental health interventions, and social support programs with and for Indigenous women, girls, and two-spirit folks?

 How are you ensuring that the agency and human rights of Indigenous sex workers are upheld? Are you meaningfully collaborating with sex workers and sex worker-serving organizations to create relevant, inclusive, and accessible services?

Local governments have an important role to play in the Calls for Justice and we have an important role to play in shaping our local decision-making.

# **Towards Collective Liberation: Dreaming of Thriving Futures**


